McClue, Mark Cruncher, Hannah McGann, Jenna Roberts, and Harper McBride. Hannah, Jenna and Harper are pupils at St Paul's R.C. Academy in Dundee, and have been supported in their work by their Art and Design teacher, Miss Amy Barber. Other stories include Dark Morbidities by myself and artist Garry Mac. This sees Cthulhu leaving Mars in the wake of a Martian-made climate crisis only to find Earth isn't much better! Here you will also find the somewhat fishy Tales of the Tay Atlanteans by artist Mark Brown. It seems that life beneath the cold grasp of the Tay River is not that much different from the surface.

We are honoured to have brilliant stories by Metaphrog (John Chalmers and Sandra Marrs), who provide a parable for the climate crisis, and Vicky Stonebridge, who considers the possibilities of renewable energy. Beneath the Law, by the hugely talented Julie Campbell, shows the unlikely friendship between a Jackdaw and a Ghost whale, set against the backdrop of the River Forth and Berwick Law. We also have a short strip by DCCS Co-ordinator Damon Herd that ponders capitalism and social issues in a seaside town.

Later that day he washed up on a Miami beach. It just so happened to be a marines boot camp. They took him in not knowing what to expect. Little did they know he would be their only hope...














